
The office will be closed on Tuesday, November 6 so that she can serve as an Election Judge. But,

SOME TIPS FOR GETTING THE MOST FROM WORSHIP

Scriptures provide guidance on how to get the most from worship. “Enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise.” “This is the day that the Lord has made let us rejoice and be glad in it.” “Make a joyful noise unto the Lord all the lands.” “Worship God in spirit and in truth for the Father seeks such to worship Him.”

Go to church for the right reason. Attend church

for worship. Joyfully enter the sanctuary focused on praising Him and finding His positive destiny for you. Be grateful for the opportunity. People in other nations may face death and persecution for worshipping Christ. They may attend church while fearing for their very lives. Be grateful and don’t miss out. Attend regularly and prioritize worship.

Some may miss out when they do attend because they fail to focus on worship. Resist the temptation to gossip, complain, or participate in other distractions. Remember the Lord made you and he’s brought you to church to hear His word and grow closer to Him. Focus on this purpose in being there. Activities or thoughts that aren’t in accord with this will sidetrack you and may prove a stumbling block to others.

When you look at those around you give thanks. They are your brothers and sisters in faith. Be positive. Act and speak to encourage and uplift the body of Christ. Remember, each person comes with a talent and ability that strengthens our fellowship. Thank them for coming. In addition, be sensitive to them. Each may have burdens or cares you aren’t aware of. They may seek a strength and power beyond mortal understanding to guide them. They don’t come to hear about lesser things but to grow closer to God. Don’t bring up petty concerns or problems right before church and as people prepare for worship. It is inconsiderate and may drive folks away. Take care of problem solving or church business another time.

Open yourself to the message God has for you. I attended church one Sunday thinking I couldn’t get anything from the preacher. I didn’t. It was my own fault. I sat back thinking about what I thought his faults were and how I would have done it differently. However, afterwards I found other people got a great deal. While I had been judgmental and proud finding fault with the preacher they were open to the message. Humble and meek they listened to the person God chose to lead us and learned something. I learned a lesson that day, so now, I put personal things aside and ask; Why is God choosing this Scripture for us today? What is going on in my life that this message speaks to? What is the most important thing I’m learning from this preacher God sent? Afterwards, I may ask people what they learned or what was the part of the message they liked best. They teach me something I might not have considered.

I hope this assists you in making the most of the experience provided in worship.

TRIANGULATION

During the recent 'Our Iceberg Is Melting Retreat' our board identified 'triangulation' as an activity that harms our congregation. 'Triangulation' occurs when one person talks for another. This will happen when a person doesn't choose to communicate directly to another person but puts somebody else in the middle. It may also happen if a person holds an opinion but doesn't want to voice it for themselves so then claims it is someone else's opinion. During triangulation people may vent or speak negatively about others. This process of backbiting and gossiping about another is emotionally draining for all involved. Gossip and backbiting robs the church of the energy necessary to build new programs and to problem solve. It may also cause drops in attendance or participation.

All can help put a stop to triangulation. First, don't speak for others or allow yourself to be placed in the middle. If someone tries to put you in the middle you can say; "I think it would be more helpful if you talked to him (or her) about how you feel rather than for me to speak for you," or "I value my friendship with both of you so I'd rather not be placed in the middle. Please tell them how you feel rather than using me to speak for you," or "I know how this is going to turn out if I speak for you. Do you see a problem? Maybe you could do something differently or go to speak with them yourself," or "We can't change him (or her) so let's figure out how you participated in the situation. Is there something you might do differently?" With these sorts of replies, you will not allow yourself to be placed in the middle. Let's work to minimize triangulation and the backbiting and gossip it causes.

Please remember that nothing shall be impossible with God. I can do all things through Christ which strengthens me. We can break old bad habits that hurt our church.



Once again, St. Peter United Church of Christ-Centralia **excelled** in make the 36th annual DuBois Center's Fall Festival a success on Sunday, October 7th, 2012. Yes, many **THANKS** to the persons listed below who worked either at the "bagging" work day at our Fellowship Hall), prepared food, donated towards bulk snacks, and/or worked in the Auxiliary-Boosters' General Store area at DuBois Center. Also, **THANKS** to those additional members of our church who attended the day's activities and supported the Fall Festival in attendance (& hopefully dollars).

As you possibly know, the Auxiliary-Boosters have had a perpetual focus on providing camp scholarships from over 30 years ago—much credit goes to **Emilie Eigenrauch** and **Edna Caraker** for helping to establish such fund 3 decades ago! Originally, the goal was set at \$1,000 per year, then increased to \$1,500 annually, and now for 10+ years the total amount designated out of the Auxiliary-Boosters' treasury is \$2,000 for the entire calendar year (to include retreats + camp).

If you recall, our own **Maddie** and **Russell Ruez** attended camp this past summer and reported highlights at the lectern on July 1st. That desire to be campers was made possible through the scholarship fund as earned at the 2011 Fall Festival's Country Stores. In fact, each received a maximum scholarship (which pays for up to 1/2 of the total amount of the registration fee) that equated to 18% of the fund for 2012.

THANK YOU to the WURSTMART WORKERS and EATERS on Oct. 21st

Yes, the title reflects my personal GRATITUDE to so many persons in our faith family and few from other churches for your willingness to work at a specific area towards making the 2012 Wurstmart become a profitable success in monetary terms but also showing the cooperative efforts of 46 volunteers (see list)—each working towards the continuation of our church's rich tradition of serving a German meal to the public. Indeed, the individual gifts of each worker definitely blended together in such cooperative effort for a successful Wurstmart.

To have a meal that feeds over 400 persons requires MANY hands for the preparation, actual serving, and clean-up!! I admit that once a superintendent, always a superintendent was apparent in the sense that it was my intent to be fully aware of what is all involved from a comprehensive viewpoint. One cannot be a superintendent unless you have been a teacher first and then a principal—experiences of walking in “someone else's shoes” gives a better understanding.

In other words, know how each area functions “behind the scene”. As a result, I have included a trivia test about Wurstmart as a response to my eyes being opened.

The following account reviews the week's preparation and follow-up in the various areas as observed by me:

❖ Thanks to 15 members who sold tickets in advance — **Judy Luer** sold 50 of them-Wow!

❖ Advertising via a big vinyl poster designed by **Kurt Storck** & funded by his parents, he sold the copyright to us/an anonymous donated fee, 18 business posters, 5 paper ads, signs in 15 churches, 3 yard signs (thanks Feed Bin for 1 site—other 2 around church), community calendar on WJBD website and radio spot on WILY, and word of mouth!

❖ Food ordering involved several stores & US Food (in St. Louis—thanks to **Barb Hill** for knowing **Dave Rothschild** and **Nan Borgmann** for filling the 10 page credit form as treasurer.

❖ Washing many big pots & pans, shelves, and counters as most are used only once a year.

❖ Not too many pastors will deliver meat from the processing place — **Pastor Lisa** did for us.

❖ Thank you to the Thursday night’s set-up crew of 12 persons. A total of 28 tables is needed in the various areas—from 4 footers to the new 8 foot ones (thank you to all your table contributors as the new ones are much lighter & require no vinyl tablecloths)!

❖ After much thought by the 150th Anniversary Committee, the centerpieces were designed by **Verna Steinkamp** after **Pastor Lisa Hart** sanded the 12 wooden bases donated by **Mr. Schaefflin**, a junior high teacher. He and his wife were given complimentary Wurstmart. tickets.

❖ At the Saturday’s cooking session, I found out that **Nan** plus **Nick and Jen Luer** (all certified in food sanitation) certainly have perfected a “system” of preparing the baked sauerkraut and gravy. (30 # of bulk sausage, 6 # of bacon, & 6 # of onions are fried before that by **Nan**). 6 persons also came to fill applesauce carry-outs, set-up for beverages. tables, etc.

❖ On Wurstmart day, there were 46 volunteers working in 8 areas, including **Russell & 4 Girl Scouts** who worked GREAT (who meet in our Fellowship Hall 2 times a month) under **Edie Ruez’** eyes.

❖ Kids’ Hope requested 52 meals for their 4 houses & main building after our serving hours. Thus, the food was packed in new bulk disposable containers (instead of 52 styofam carry outs) and delivered by the **Reichenbachers** as **Judy** also serves as their secretary.

❖ We served 407 paid meals plus provided 18 working volunteers at Salvation Army on Monday with the left-over side dishes and anonymously-donated 40 links of sausage. After all of our workers had taken what they wanted, we still had enough left to feed about 20 persons minus the mashed potatoes and bread. Being told that the Salvation Army feeds their volunteers (those of us who volunteer at the hospital receive a free meal so we do not have to bring our own which we appreciate), we were pleased to be the S.A.’s “answer to prayer” for the noon meal. Talking about “outreach” in the community –grateful they were.

❖ We still have frozen fried sausage for sale—5 for \$5.00 (just reheat in microwave-yummy)!
