At the annual meeting of the Illinois South Conference there will be three offerings presented during the two day event to be held October 24 and 25 at the National Shrine of Our Lady of the Snows in Belleville.

One is for items for Uni-Pres Kindercottage in East St. Louis. We have done this for several years, and all items are greatly appreciated. A separate listing shows their wish list. (At the end of this issue of the newsletter.) We will collect them here in our church on the table in the hall and transport them to the meeting. They will then be stacked along with the other churches donations to show the generosity of the congregations of Illinois South Conference. Kindercottage will transport the items from the Shrine. If you would prefer to give cash, give your donation to **Verna Steinkamp** who will purchase suitable items.

Another offering has become a staple at the meeting called the "noisy offering" whereby churches bring small or large amounts of change (bills and checks also) which is collected in a bucket to make noise. The noisy offering this year goes to the Hunger/Food Action. A box will be on the table in the hall for your change (or bills, checks, etc.) to be presented at the appropriate time.

The third offering will go the Hoyleton Ministries Transitional Housing. This supports the housing which cares for residents who have aged out of other Hoyleton programs. Another designed box will be on the table in the hall.

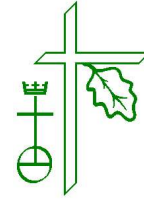

Foods you can donate

Canned – fruits, vegetables, juice (full strength juice only) when donating canned items, think about quantity Although any amount is appreciated we feed a large number of people daily. Pastas- spaghetti, egg noodles, macaroni, Boxed cereal, hot cereal (oatmeal, cream of wheat, quick grits) (Nutritious types, although a little sweetness is appreciated and wanted), Snack Foods (again healthy), Vanilla wafers, all types of crackers, Boxes of jello, oatmeal/oatmeal, with raisin cookies, All types of fresh fruit, Individual cups of yogurt (there are many brands targeting children), Cheese/peanut butter crackers, Rice cakes (caramel), Nutri Grain Bars. Granola Bars (chewy), Cookies of all types, although we really need to be sure they are healthy, according to the State guidelines, every once in a while, sugary and creme- filled is good.

Last Thoughts

Dolls, when donating, please remember, we accept boy & girl dolls and all races of dolls. Diversity is an important lesson. These dolls can be about careers, family and other countries. This also applies to books and music. We want our children to know that our world is composed of all types, colors, and both sexes of people. Musical CD selections can include opera, jazz, modern, classical, easy listening, because we are introducing them to the world of music. You can also donate frozen foods but again, you must think of quantity and nutritional requirements for children.
